
### **Concept Cubes**

#### What you need:

- Paper
- Markers or coloured pencils
- Cube template

#### What to do:

- 1. Give each student a vocabulary word and ask them to use each of the six sections of the pattern to write the:
  - definition
  - explanation or significance
  - example
  - category
  - why it's important/what it's used for/characteristic
- 2. In groups of two or three, with cubes made by other students (you don't have your own cubes) take turns rolling a cube. Whatever comes up for the roll, use this to explain the relationship between that word or phrase and the target word.
