#### SCHOOL EVIDENCE EXAMINATIONS

#### 21-25 August 2023

#### **Examination Procedures**

- Full correct school uniform is to be worn by all students.
- Morning exams start at 9:00am. Students need to be lining up on the netball courts at 8:45am on the second bell.
- Afternoon exams start at 1:00pm. Students need to be lining up on the netball courts at 12:45pm.
- Students will line up in their subject classes.
- For 2 hour exams students must stay for the whole time (except L2MAS and scholarship Biology students who may leave after one hour)
- For 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> 3 hour exams students will be permitted to leave after two hours but we recommend you take the time allocated. Once you leave you will not be permitted back in.
- Nobody is permitted to leave in the last 15 mins of an exam.
- If toilets are needed, students should put their hand up and wait for a supervisor.
- It is compulsory for all students to attend all exams for their timetabled subjects. Students who forget about an exam or fail to arrive for a scheduled exam, or choose not to come to their timetabled exam will be required to sit the exam they missed during make up sessions from 3:15-5:15pm the following week.

#### What can be taken into the Examination Room:

- Cell phones, car keys, wallets and watches (both digital and analogue) must be in a clear plastic bag and placed under your seat. Phones must be off.
- Pens, rulers etc. Must be in a clear plastic bag.
- See through water bottles are allowed, food is not (you won't be allowed out for a drink)
- Calculators (if the exam allows them to be used)
- Refill pad if needed will be checked by exam supervisors. At the end of the year refill paper cannot be taken into the examination room with you.

#### What cannot be taken in:


- Prohibited electronic devices like MP3 players and iPods, non-approved calculators, PDAs and electronic translators are not permitted in the examination room. At the end of the year these will be removed from candidates by supervisors and may be sent to NZQA.
- Study notes etc. cannot be taken into the examination room.











#### YOUNG WRITERS' AWARDS 2023


Are you the next literary genius who will make millions selling your work for books, film scripts or even award-winning song lyrics?

#### Al Writing tools and NCEA

I would like to draw your attention to an important topic; the use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) and language tools like ChatGPT and classroom and NCEA assessment.

As technology continues to advance, AI tools have become increasingly accessible and offer an astonishing range of capabilities. They can be helpful for brainstorming ideas and conducting research. However, we strongly discourage students from using AI when working on essays, reports, and personal responses, particularly when it comes to the actual creation of content for any NCEA assessment.

Al generated work lacks the student authentic voice, critical thinking, and personal reflection. It is very important for students to develop their own writing skills, which include expressing original ideas, structuring arguments, and articulating their thoughts. The process of writing a well-structured essay or report is a crucial part of learning, allowing students to develop their ability to analyse and communicate.

Saying that, we can also see that AI tools can have a place in initial brainstorming, generating topics, and essay questions. But just like a student may ask their teacher for some help deciding on a topic a student wouldn't then ask their teacher to write the report on the topic, same for AI. Students shouldn't rely on them as a substitute for their own critical thinking and creativity.

As we navigate this changing landscape, the use of technology in education, we feel strongly that we need to reinforce a culture of integrity and responsibility. By having an open dialogue and maintaining the value of authentic academic work, we can encourage our students to become independent, critical thinkers who rise to challenges and are fully invested in their education.

Thank you for your ongoing support. Together, we can continue guide our students towards a future that value in the essentials skills and using technology to assist learning, not replace it.

#### This week was Cook Island Language Week.

This year's theme for 'Epetoma o te reo Māori Kū<mark>ki 'Āirani – Cook Islands Language Week is 'Ātuitui'ia au ki</mark> te au peu o tōku kāinga Ipukarea, which means, "connect me to the traditions & culture of my homeland".

The 2023 theme is an extension of last year's theme of 'Atuitui'ia au ki te Oneone o tōku 'Ui Tupuna, or "connect me to the soil of my ancestors".

Where last year's theme was an effort to bridge the 'disconnect' that many of our Cook Islands people are feeling, this year's theme focuses on deepening our people's connection to their culture, and ultimately, their language. It focuses on connecting Cook Islanders to the traditions, cultures and dialects of their many islands.

Setting the theme for Epetoma o te reo Māori Kūki 'Āirani has never been about stringing together beautiful words. It has always been about intentionally deepening the bonds of our people to their language through their familial ties, through the cultural traditions of their enua/vaka, and the songs, dance, and pe'e's of their family.

Together, these are the pillars that empower Cook Islanders to be proud in their culture, language and identity, ultimately reinforcing this year's theme of 'Ātuitui'ia au ki te au peu o tōku kāinga Ipukarea.

#### Te Reo Māori Class Trip

On Wednesday 26 July 2023 the L1 Te Reo Māori Class travelled to Takapō (AKA Tekapo). After school they travelled up to Te Tihi-o-maru (Timaru) and on the way they stopped at Kaihīnaki (Moeraki Boulders). The class had been looking at the pūrākau (Māori traditions) of the Araiteuru Waka capsizing at Matakaea (Shag Point) and the gourds that were on board are the Kaihīnaki (Moeraki Boulders). They stayed at the Timaru Top Ten Holiday Park and the next morning went to Te Ana - Māori Rock Art Museum. Students were able to immerse themselves in the history and culture of Ngā Tahu and the Māori Rock Art. They then travelled through to Takapō where it was picturesque with snow still on the ground and on the mountains. They went to the Dark Sky Project where we looked at the sky and the stars through a Te Ao Māori world view. Then went to the Takapō Springs and went ice skating. The class stayed at the Lakeside Lodge on the waterfront right beside the hot pools. The next day they did snow tubing and drove past Āoraki and his brothers that were majestic with snow over them. Then they travelled back through Te Manahuna (Mackenzie Basin) and through the Waitaki Valley where they had been learning about the Māori history and the mahika kai sites that they used to gather food. This was an amazing trip that will stay on the yearly calendar.





#### **Help Your Community Vote**




